1 | HISTORY AND MISSION

Created in 2011 and based in Togo since 2012, the OADCPH (African Organisation for the Development of Centres for Persons with Disabilities) is the only solution of its kind in Africa for Access to Assistive Technology.

It is a non-governmental organisation recognised as being of public utility by the Togolese government, with which it signed a programme agreement in 2015 and a headquarters agreement in 2018.

The OADCPH currently works with more than 80 member rehabilitation centres in 34 African countries and is open to all private/public disability stakeholders, but also to organisations and institutions working in the field of disability in Africa.

2 MISSION AND OBJECTIVES

"OADCPH's mission is to promote the right of access to quality assistive technology and rehabilitation care at lower cost for more people with disabilities and elderly in Africa in a sustainable manner."

The OADCPH has four objectives:

Helping to improve the quality of health care provision in the field of disability in Africa

Promoting the sustainability of rehabilitation facilities in Africa

Ensuring a reliable and strengthening the capacities of stakeholders working in the field of disability in Africa

3 OUR OPERATION

OADCPH is governed by a board of directors composed of representatives of the structures for people with disabilities, representatives of the partners, but also supporters from different sectors of activity of the community.

The Board delegates authority to the Executive Board, which manages the NGO and ensures its smooth running.

OADCPH is an African NGO composed of members who are rehabilitation service providers, and is open to all private/public disability stakeholders, but also to organisations and institutions working in the field of disability in Africa.

OUR TEAM

The team is composed of qualified staff with an average level of Master's degree. The current workforce is 15 people divided into five (05) departments supervised by an Executive Management:

- Continuing education
- Human Resources and Projects
- Finance and Accounting
- Procurement
- Logistics

Staff capacity building is a crucial pillar for OADCPH. Each year, staff benefit from an in-house training programme led by the employees themselves or by external expertise.

Where necessary, staff attend external training courses. Grants and contributions are also given to staff for various further training courses.

Also involved in the running of the NGO in 2021 are a team of 3 prosthetics and orthotics consultants and a computer specialist, as well as daily staff as required.

OADCPH attaches particular importance to health at work of its employees in the workplace. To this end, it has commissioned an ergonomic audit to bring each employee's workstation up to standard.

4 ENVIRONMENTAL RESPONSIBILITY



Aware of the major economic, social and environmental challenges facing the planet and by placing sustainable development at the heart of its strategy, OADCPH assumes its environmental responsibilities by contributing to the fight against global warming.

Since 2015, it has invested in the use of photovoltaic solar panels and is now 95% powered by this system. Regular maintenance and energy audits of the electrical and solar installations allow for a detailed assessment of the building's energy performance and guarantee the proper use of energy and a positive impact on the environment.

5 OUR AREAS OF INTERVENTION

From three (03) areas of intervention, the OADCPH after ten years of activities, has now moved to five (05) areas which are linked to three of the four domains related to an effective assistive technology ecosystem as defined by the WHO 1 :



Products and supply: via the association's central purchasing office and the development of innovative solutions



Staff development: through its continuing education programmes



Servie provision: through its access to care programme and its advisory support programme.

Continuous training of rehabilitation professionals, <u>service</u> managers and administrative staff

For the OADCPH, the need to maintain and update the skills of the different actors, professional or not, intervening in the field of rehabilitation is obvious, so that they continue to guarantee the quality of care, and also the sustainability of rehabilitation centres.

Since 2013, the OADCPH has been organising continuing education courses for the various actors from the member countries and now has a catalogue of more than 40 modules in prosthetics and orthotics, physiotherapy and management.

Supporting access to services for the most vulnerable

In the socio-economic context of low-income countries, it is difficult for a large majority of people with disabilities to access even the most basic rehabilitation care and assistive products because of financial barriers.

Through this component, OADCPH has two objectives:

- To promote access to rehabilitation care and assistive products for people with disabilities and the most vulnerable elderly: by providing rehabilitation centres and professionals with materials for their management, by referring them for rehabilitation care, by providing them directly with technical aids.
- To participate in the operation of rehabilitation centres and the development of the activities of rehabilitation professionals.

The actions in this section are supported by the OADCPH and its partners (Handicap International, Aqualeg, IRMA, PENTA Group, SM Europe, Alcura, Couple PERIER)

Procurement of assistive products via the central purchasing office

For those in need, access to different support products is hampered by various factors, including the cost of services. This is directly affected by factors such as the cost of products, high procurement costs, the long and complex process of importing products, the variety of suppliers, etc. The OADCPH's associative purchasing centre was created to help rehabilitation providers overcome these obstacles.

It sources from various international suppliers and makes rehabilitation components and assistive products available in Africa to facilitate their acquisition by the various rehabilitation centres and facilities. The purchasing centre uses its skills, expertise and dynamism to ensure rapid delivery by land, air and sea.

Advisory support for the development of services and for technical issues

The OADCPH is committed to the development of rehabilitation centres, and as such, it offers its support and allows the various rehabilitation actors to benefit from its experience and resources. This component intervenes at all levels of its actions as a means of support, monitoring and guaranteeing the achievement of the various objectives defined in favour of people with disabilities in the SDGs.

The OADCPH thus accompanies its members and other actors in the rehabilitation field:

- In the discovery and knowledge of new suppliers and their products
- In the choice of quality equipment and appropriate technology according to available budgets
- In setting up rehabilitation services
- In designing projects
- In the search for funding
- In carrying out their various projects

- Assistance via tele-rehabilitation



OADCPH's continuing education courses are aimed at rehabilitation professionals, service managers and administrative staff. They take place face-to-face and bring together participants from various member countries.

Since the advent of the COVID19 pandemic, this component has been severely affected by health constraints, which reduces the frequency of training.

SUPPORT AND GUIDANCE

OADCPH responds to requests from its members and partners in various fields of activity related to assistive technologies.

If necessary, and when OADCPH has the means, it responds favourably to certain requests for grants and material support.

OADCPH's support is also the support it provides to member centres, professionals and structures working in the field of rehabilitation, by making available to them the stock of equipment from its central purchasing office. The structures benefiting from this support thus have easy access to equipment at an affordable cost, and also flexibility of reimbursement.

Thanks to the Impacte 3D project, the OADCPH now has a Fab lab and expertise in the manufacture of 3D orthoses.


A new partnership for the development of technological solutions in equipmentprosthetics and orthotics








HR Development

- In 2021, the number of staff has increased from 14 to 15 employees with a new recruitment for the position of project assistant.
- 5 employees, 4 of whom are funded by OADCPH, are currently being trained in logistics, computer maintenance and accounting-finance.

ATIF PROJECT

Following the call for projects launched by ATIF (AT IMPACT FUND) in the framework of the AT2030 programme financed by the British aid and led by the Global Disability Innovation (GDI) Hub in collaboration with Brink and Catalyst Fund, OADCPH is one of the 5 organisations whose projects hasve been selected.

ATIF Portfolio

In 2021 we tested new financing, distribution and delivery models – focusing on innovative solutions to ongoing challenges:

MiracleFeet - bringing a low-cost, nonsurgical solutions for the treatment of impairment caused by clubfoot

hearX - increasing access to hearing aids by providing alternative distribution models and lay testing

Wazi - The first prescription eyewear brand designed and manufactured in Uganda

Koalaa - Affordable upper limb, soft prosthetic for the Sierra Leone market

OADCPH – facilitating access to quality AT to rehabilitation centres through technical support, innovative distribution and professional capacity development


The African Organisation for the Development of Centres for People with Disabilities (OADCPH) facilitates access to quality AT and services through a lower cost distribution model, rehabilitation professional capacity development and technical support to rehabilitation centres in Africa.

Distribution is a key part of the assistive tech value chain and a key barrier to sustainable scale for many organisations. OADCPH supports effective AT distribution via purchasing in bulk and securing favourable payment terms from suppliers, leveraging agreements and relationships with shipping companies, and advising customers on the best value for money for AT purchases.

ATIF is working with OADCPH to digitise the logistics and sales operations and to test and replicate the entire business model in East and Southern Africa, setting up operations via a distribution centre in Kenya.

OADCPH works in 34 countries in Africa. It also has 80+ member organisations.

The OADCPH thus benefits from the funding and technical support of the ATIF team to:

- The expansion of its activities in East Africa via Kenya in order to be closer to this part of Africa
- the implementation of a personalised management software package, integrating the management of the central purchasing office
- the setting up of a solidarity-based e-commerce platform for the central purchasing office.

Achievements in 2021:

During the 06 months of activities in 2021, the project enabled OADCPH:

• to carry out an exploratory mission to Kenya to study the possibilities of expanding its activities in East Africa:

This mission made it possible to explore the possibilities of setting up a relay in Kenya, in order to get closer to the countries of East Africa.

to implement a management software package:

Thanks to the technical support of the ATIF team and the expertise of 2M Synergie, the OADCPH now has a software package that takes into account its general management and in particular the management of its central purchasing office. This software package adapted to the management of a central purchasing office for rehabilitation components and equipment is a first and is intended to be an important lever in the search for solutions for easy access to assistive technologies in Africa.

• to set up a solidarity-based e-commerce platform:

The platform will allow OADCPH to respond more quickly to different requests, to make information available to everyone in Africa and worldwide. Several options have been studied with the ATIF and 2MS team, and a prototype is being designed.

• to sign a partnership with APDK (Association for the Physically Disabled of Kenya):

After several searches, OADCPH has identified and signed a partnership with APDK for the expansion of its activities in East Africa. This partnership marks the beginning of a collaboration that will start in the coming days.

POUDRETTE PROJECT

Since 2017, Handicap International has been supporting OADCPH in the realisation of this project, the ultimate goal of which is to give people who cannot afford it the chance to benefit from assistive products (prostheses, body support equipment, medical equipment...).

Handicap International (Humanité Inclusion) recovers thousands of prostheses and other assistive products that should have been thrown away and recycles them in its "Poudrette" workshop. These products are prepared and made available at HI's Poudrette warehouse in France. OADCPH, with its own funds, organises the collection and transport to its warehouse in Togo, and then takes care of the redistribution throughout Africa.

The POUDRETTE project is involved in one of the OADCPH's axes, "Aid for access to services", and contributes on the one hand to the care of the most vulnerable people with disabilities in Africa, thanks to its network of rehabilitation centres and professionals, and on the other hand to the operation of rehabilitation centres.

DONATION PROJECT

According to the WHO World Report on Disability, more than one billion people live with a disability and by 2030 this figure is expected to rise to 2 billion people who will need assistive technology. 80% of people with disabilities live in low- and middle-income countries, particularly in Africa, yet access to assistive technology is more difficult there, mainly due to lack of financial resources.

The objective of this project is to contribute to the reduction of inequalities in access to assistive technologies in Africa by:

- providing rehabilitation centres and professionals with equipment for the care of the most vulnerable people with disabilities.
- providing the patient with the assistance product he or shethey needs, on prescription.
