ABOUT OADCPH

♦ HISTORY

The African Organization for the Development of Centers for Persons with Disabilities (OADCPH), is a non-governmental organisation (NGO) unique in Africa. It was founded in 2011 and has been based in Togo, West Africa, since 2012. OADCPH is recognised as being of public utility by the Togolese government, with which it signed a programme agreement in 2015 and a headquarters agreement in 2018.

OADCPH currently has over 90 member centres, professionals and rehabilitation structures in 34 African countries. It is open to all private and public stakeholders in the field of disability, as well as to organisations and institutions working in the field of disability in Africa.

OADCPH is governed by a board of directors made up of representatives of organisations for people with disabilities, partner representatives and supporters from various sectors.

MISSION AND OBJECTIVES

"OADCPH's mission is to promote the right of access to quality assistive technologies and rehabilitation care at lower cost for a greater number of people with disabilities in Africa, in a sustainable manner."

❖ OBJECTIVES

Specifically, OADCPH works to:

- Helping to improve the quality of care in the field of disability in Africa
- Ensuring a reliable and secure supply of assistive technology in Africa
- Promoting the sustainability of rehabilitation facilities in Africa
- Supporting and building the capacity of disability stakeholders in Africa.

AREAS INTERVENTION

OADCPH works in 5 main areas:

Helping the most vulnerable to access services

Through this programme, the OADCPH is helping to care for the most vulnerable disabled people by providing them or rehabilitation centres with equipment for their care.

This part of the programme has a dual focus, supporting both the care of the most vulnerable disabled people and the operation of rehabilitation centres in Africa.

The actions in this section are supported by the OADCPH's central purchasing unit and partners, mainly Handicap International and Penta Group.

Ongoing training rehabilitation professionals, service managers and administrative staff

The OADCPH is aware of the need to maintain and update the skills and knowledge of the various players, both professional and non-professional, involved in the field of rehabilitation, so that they can continue to provide quality services, there by guaranteeing the long-term future of rehabilitation centres.

Since 2013, the OADCPH has been organising continuing education courses for the various players from its member countries, and now has a catalogue of more than 40 modules on orthopaedic devices, functional rehabilitation and management.

♣ Supplying rehabilitation centres

Thanks to it's association's central purchasing unit, OADCPH makes mobility aids, consumables, raw materials and rehabilitation equipment available in Africa, sourcing them from a range of international suppliers.

In this way, it facilitates the acquisition of the various rehabilitation centres and structures that are members in the different African countries.

Advisory support for service development and technical issues

OADCPH is committed to the development of centres for people with disabilities in Africa, and as such offers it's support and enables the various players in the rehabilitation field to benefit from it's experience and resources.

This support is ongoing and available to all OADCPH members and partners.

Developing innovative solutions

To overcome the many barriers faced by service providers in delivering quality services at an affordable price, and the obstacles encountered accessing services by people in need, OADCPH is seeking to develop and implement new products, new services, or new working models and methods.

***** ENVIRONMENTAL RESPONSIBILITY

Aware of the climate emergency, OADCPH has been committed to a sustainable approach since 2015 by adopting photovoltaic solar panels. Thanks to this innovative technology, the organisation is now 95% solar-powered, significantly reducing it's carbon footprint.

To ensure long-term efficiency of this system, OADCPH carries out regular maintenance and in-depth energy audits. This rigorous approach optimises the use solar energy and maximises the environmental benefits.

MISSIONS AND PARTNERSHIP MEETINGS

Since 2024, the OADCPH has benefited from technical support ATscale through the assistance of the French firm STEPS. The aim of this collaboration is to structure and strengthen OADCPH's future strategies in order to increase it's impact and extend it's field action to other types of disability.

Alfaset specialises in supplying high-quality, upgradeable components for mobility assistance technologies. Compliant with international standards, these Swiss components have been successfully used for over 20 years by people with disabilities around the world. Alfaset also produces and distributes the ICRC's Rehab'Impulse brand.



This fruitful meeting led to the signing of a partnership agreement, enabling the OADCPH to become a distributor of the Rehab'Impulse brand. This agreement will improve access to these components in Africa. The OADCPH is already working to develop specific kits and offer training courses for professionals.

This partnership is part of the long-standing collaboration between OADCPH and Alfaset reinforcing their shared commitment to the inclusion and independence of people with disabilities.

Partnership initiatives are already underway, and the organisation is delighted to be able to expand it's network of suppliers to provide Africa with greater access to high-quality, diversified assistive technologies.

HELPING THE MOST VULNERABLE TO HAVE ACCESS TO ASSISTIVE TECHNOLOGIES

For many people in Africa, access to orthopaedic devices and technical aids remains a major challenge, particularly for vulnerable populations. In 2024, OADCPH's commitment was strengthened, guided by a clear vision: to offer everyone practical means of regaining their independence and dignity.

With the support of it's partners, OADCPH has reached nearly 800 final beneficiaries in Togo, Ivory coast, Benin, Senegal, Democratic Republic of Congo and Djibouti. These actions have thus promoted the social inclusion of these people. These efforts are not just one-offs, but are essential steps towards building a society where every individual, whatever their abilities, can play a full part in community life.

Reuse of recycled components with Humanity & Inclusion (Handicap International)

Improving access to assistive technologies for disadvantaged populations has been at the heart of the partnership between Handicap International and OADCPH since 2017. This innovative project involves giving a second life to prostheses through recovery and recycling by Handicap International, before they are transported to Togo and redistributed across Africa by OADCPH.

This initiative is part of OADCPH's commitment to ensuring access to rehabilitation services for all, including people with disabilities the most vulnerable. In addition to meeting essential needs, this project helps to support the operation of rehabilitation centres and to strengthen their impact on the ground. This collaboration embodies the OADCPH's commitment to making inclusion and access to services a lasting reality on the African continent.



Reuse of recycled components for amputees outside to Penta Medical Recycling

Since 2021, Penta Medical Recycling, a US-based charity, has been working with OADCPH to support vulnerable disabled people in Africa through the recovery and recycling of used prostheses.

By transforming this waste into opportunities, Penta Medical Recycling plays a key role international solidarity. Operating in countries such as Vietnam, Thailand, Sri Lanka and Guatemala, the organisation supplies recycled components, thousands of amputees access suitable fitting solutions.



This collaboration between Penta Medical Recycling and the OADCPH is part of an inclusive and sustainable approach aimed at improving access to technical aids for the most vulnerable populations in Africa. By recycling waste and reintegrating it into the rehabilitation circuit, this partnership is helping to meet the challenge of making services accessible to all.

"HANDICAPE PROTHESE is a Beninese NGO specialising in orthopaedic devices, rehabilitation, foot reflexology and other services. A member since 2024, it benefits from the support of OADCPH and is very active with vulnerable disabled people.

Portrait of "SETTIN Franki", Director of the NGO HANDICAPE PROTHESE:

SETTIN Franki, 33, is a Beninese whose life is a testament to resilience and commitment.

Orphaned at the age of 6, his life was turned upside down at the age of 14 when he had to have a lower limb amputated because of the Buruli ulcer.

a disease misunderstood in his village and associated with witchcraft.

Due to a lack of funds, he had to school, but found new hope in 2004 thanks to an NGO that provided him with a prosthesis and training.

Inspired by experience Franki decided to become an orthoprosthetist to help other people at situation similar, well although has had to interrupted his training in Ghana after eight months for financial reasons.

In 2009, he set up the NGO "Handicap Prothèse" in Bohicon, offering orthopaedic-fitting, rehabilitation and well-being services.

In 2010, it opened a second centre in Cotonou.

Very sensitive to the cause of disabled people, he uses his own means to help them.

SETTIN Franki's mission is clear:

"Bringing accessible care to vulnerable disabled people".


His extraordinary commitment to this cause is testament to his resilience and determination to pursue his dream.



Strategic collaboration with OADCPH

In 2024, SETTIN Franki's path crossed that of the African Organization for the Development of Centers for Persons with Disabilities (OADCPH). Convinced by it's dynamism and commitment, the OADCPH decided to support Handicap Prothese by donating salvaged components. Thanks to this first donation, SETTIN Franki has been able to fit more than 10 vulnerable disabled people in Benin.


Following a serious motorbike accident, Mr Brice had to have a tibia amputated.


After a difficult convalescence, he benefited from the support of the NGO Handicap Prothese.

Thanks to Using the

components donated by OADCPH, a tibial prosthesis was made for him, enabling him to regain his independence and resume his activities.

Diagnosed with diabetes, Mr Emma first had one leg amputated, then the second. He became completely dependent due to a lack of funds orthopaedic devices. Mr Emma has just been fitted with two prostheses and will finally be able to regain independence.





Mr. AYITE, victim of a traffic accident, unfortunately lost his left leg. He was fitted with a prosthesis using salvaged components.

Mr. Sylvain has been an amputee for several years due to diabetes. He was able to obtain his first prosthesis thanks to recovery components.





Charlie, a young boy born with malformation his right foot, now benefits from the care of the Handicap Prothese rehabilitation center, a partner of OADCPH. Thanks to donations received, this center supports vulnerable people, disabled offering Charlie sessions to correct his lower limb.

Mr. Anselme, who suffers from chronic diabetes, had to stop his treatment for lack of funds, which led to a severe infection and the amputation of his leg.

With a prosthesis supplied thanks to components sent by OADCPH, he is striving to rebuild his life.



An ambitious vision for rural Benin

SETTIN Franki is pursuing it's ambition to make rehabilitation care accessible in remote areas of Benin. In October 2024, it launched a pilot project in 4 communes (Kétou, Houinhi, Zandjanado and Kové), with the aim gradually extending these actions to all 77 communes in the country.

The project will provide identified beneficiaries with orthopaedic devices and tools to develop income-generating activities, there by promoting their social inclusion and autonomy. During this first phase, a team of professionals organised mobile consultations in the communes to identify more than thirty beneficiaries.



The next step will be to manufacture and supply equipment and technical aids such as walking sticks and wheelchairs.

The pilot project is based on Handicap Prothese's own funds. OADCPH, supported by Handicap International, Penta Group and other donors, is backing the project.

"Organisations such as Handicap Prothese use donations of salvaged parts to provide adapted equipment to vulnerable disabled people, who are often excluded lack of financial means. These initiatives restore autonomy and dignity to beneficiaries while promoting inclusion and solidarity within communities.

With the support of partners, these efforts can be extended to remote areas and reach more people in need. In this way, these organisations enable more disabled people to gain access to essential equipment and regain their independence, promoting their full participation in social life".

CONTINUING EDUCATION

Having recently become a member, the Don Orione centre in Bonoua quickly complied with the conditions required to benefit from the OADCPH's expertise.

At the centre's request, the OADCPH mobilised a trainer to enhance the skills of professionals at the Don Orione centre in Ivory Coast. This training was accompanied by a donation of components to support learning and practice.

The training sessions focused on the manufacture of various items of equipment, in particular CTM support and correction corsets (measurement, manufacture, fitting and delivery) and trans-femoral prostheses with integrated ischium (measurement, manufacture, assembly and fitting). These activities enabled the centre's team to update and strengthen it's technical skills.



SUPPLY AND DISTRIBUTION OF ASSISTANCE PRODUCTS



The number of orders for 2023 is 526, of which 356 have been confirmed. For 2024, the total number of orders is 456, of which 307 have been confirmed, representing a 14% decrease in confirmed orders.

We have also seen a 6% fall in the number of of the total value of orders compared with last year. This decrease does not necessarily reflect a fall in the number of confirmed orders, but rather indicates that some members have reduced the value of their orders in 2024.

including DJIBOUTI, IVORY COAST and TOGO.

This decline can be explained by a number of factors, including financial constraints and a change in the needs and priorities of centres, limiting access to assistive technologies for those who need them.

To remedy this situation, in 2024 OADCPH received support from ATscale, which commissioned a French consultancy help it draw up it's 2025-2029 strategy. This work, carried out over a periodidentified and analysed the centres' supply difficulties, leading to the definition of appropriate strategies to address them.

In addition, OADCPH strengthened its network of partners in 2024 with new collaborations Mali and Senegal, as well as with the Alfaset supplier in Switzerland, paving the way for new promising opportunities.







HOW OADCPH WORKS

• Audit of the 2023 accounts

OADCPH's accounts for 2023 were audited by the French firm R2M Audit, which then certified them.

Administrative management

OADCPH's operations are structured around five departments under the supervision of the Executive Board:

- · The secretariat,
- Human resources and project management,
- · Accounting,
- Procurement,
- Logistics.

The current team has 12 members, including the Executive Director.

Strengthening communication

The OADCPH has signed up to the United Nations Volunteers (UNV) online programme, benefiting for 12 weeks from the support of three digital communications experts. This first experience,



The results were highly satisfactory. On the strength of this success, the OADCPH plans to repeat the experience in the near future.

In-house staff training

05 in-house modules have enhanced staff skills:

- How an organisation works (Introduction to how an organisation works) of an organisation)
- The importance of communication at OADCPH
- Incident reports
- NTDs (sharing knowledge on neglected tropical diseases)
- The OADCPH Staff Solidarity Fund (CSPO)

OADCPH's solidarity fund is based on mutual aid between employees to help them through economic difficulties or significant events (birth, marriage, bereavement). It offers honour loans, donations for social events and financing.

It is funded by monthly contributions from staff, the Director and subsidies from the OADCPH, and is managed by a dedicated office, which processes applications and consults members to decide on grants. Its operations are governed by a statute, internal rules and regular meetings to evaluate its activities.

PROJECTS

Implementation of OADCPH's 2025-2029 strategic documents thanks to the support of ATscale

Following a call for tenders issued by ATscale, the French firm STEPS was selected to assist the OADCPH in drawing up its strategic documents for the period 2025-2029.

This six-month assignment actively mobilised entire OADCPH team. Beforehand, OADCPH conducted an in-depth review and carried out its own internal diagnosis. This analysis document, which served as the basis for the work, was presented at the meeting to launch the assignment, held at OADCPH headquarters in the presence of STEPS and ATscale representatives.

• Project to "Set up a unit to manufacture walking sticks for people with reduced mobility in Togo and Africa from recycled plastic waste".

Funded by ANESVAD, this project initiated by the OADCPH and GIP (Green Industry Plast) Togo officially began it's implementation phase with a training session for stakeholders on Neglected Tropical Diseases.






The production unit, located within GIP, was equipped with logistical support OADCPH's central purchasing unit.

In charge of implementation, GIP Togo has set up a specialised technical team to ensure that the unit runs smoothly.





The first prototyping test resulted in the manufacture of four models of raw cane handles in a variety of colours, designed from recycled and non-recycled polypropylene plastic. The aim of the next trials is to perfect the technique in order improve product quality.

CHALLENGES AND OBSTACLES IN 2024

OADCPH faces major challenges that hamper it's actions and limit its potential for expansion. The high cost of acquiring orthopaedic products, combined with inadequate tax exemptions on such equipment, is putting significant pressure on it's business model. These constraints make procurement difficult and limit the organisation's ability to build up adequate stocks to respond quickly to the growing needs of rehabilitation centres and beneficiaries. Pre-financing of orders with suppliers, which is often required, makes resource management even more complex.

At the same time, the lack of solid financial partnerships considerably reduces the OADCPH's room for manoeuvre to invest in key initiatives such as building the capacity of rehabilitation professionals, developing innovative solutions, and acquiring assistive technologies in large quantities at competitive prices. An additional challenge is the distance between the organisation's infrastructure and certain remote regions. This can lengthen response times to supply requests, slowing down the organisation's inclusive and equitable mission.

OUR OUTLOOK

OADCPH is looking to the future to strengthen it's impact and sustainability:

- ➤ Obtain additional tax exemptions on assistive technologies, and negotiate more advantageous supply conditions with suppliers. This will optimise the management of it's supplies.
- > Diversify and adapt it's training programmes to improve the skills of rehabilitation centre professionals, with content that multilingual and accessible.
- Increase its storage capacity through financing for larger volume purchases. At the same time, expand its range of support technologies and develop innovative projects.
- > Strengthening relationships with suppliers to establish strategic partnerships.
- > Expand and further equip it's logistics infrastructure to better meet the needs of beneficiaries.
- Extend it's activities to other regions of Africa and, in the long term, develop an online platform facilitate access to continuing education and training adapted educational resources for rehabilitation professionals.






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
